Chair Tokuda and Members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means:

I, along with Wimmie Wong Lui, am presenting testimony in **support** of HB 820 HD2 SD1 Relating to Public Early Childhood Education and HB 821 HD1 Relating to Early Education. HB 820 HD2 SD1's purpose is to establish the Executive Office on Early Learning Prekindergarten Program to be administered by the Executive Office on Early Learning and provided through the Department of Education public schools and public charter schools. The purpose of HB 821 HD1 is to clarify the respective roles of the Department of Education and the Executive Office on Early Learning.

We are both private citizens who are interested in advancing early learning in our state.

We have previously testified in support of SB 844 which is a companion bill for HB 820. HB 820 HD2 SD1 is very similar to SB 844 SD2. There are a few differences in definitions and drafting, however both statutorily create the public pre kindergarten program that will be administered by the Executive Office on Early Learning.

We are pleased with the EOEL Prekindergarten program that began serving children during the 2014-15 school year. The teachers have been able to implement high-quality standards, including using individual child assessments, engaging families, and aligning their curriculum with the Hawaii Early Learning and Development Standards, all of which are linked to positive child outcomes.

We believe that the Executive Office on Early Learning should administer the program with the services provided through the Department of Education public schools and charter schools. We therefore support the public early childhood education program described in HB 820 HD2 SD1 and in SB 844 SD2.

With regards to HB 821 HD1 except for the defective effective date we support the HD1 draft.

We urge the committee to pass both bills so that the few differences between the House and Senate drafts can be resolved by a conference committee.

Thank you for your support in advancing early learning in Hawaii.
