#### RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Chair Kidani and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on S.B. 984. The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) does not support S.B. 984 for the following reasons:

- 1. We are working with the Department of Education (DOE) to implement a statewide service level agreement to ensure that school work order repair performance will be the same regardless of what island the school is located on. DAGS' neighbor island school repair operations will be adopting the performance metric currently used by DOE Facility Maintenance operations. This will provide the reporting mechanism to measure DAGS performance on the same level as the DOE facilities operations so an equitable and objective evaluation can be made.
- 2. In addition to the school repair and maintenance functions for 93 schools, DAGS is also responsible for the repair and maintenance of the 50 state facilities and 28 public libraries on the neighbor islands. With the

171 facilities DAGS is responsible for, utilization of the trade crews are maximized. If the neighbor island school repair functions were transferred to DOE, there would be redundant trade (i.e. one plumber for the DOE, one plumber for DAGS etc.), supervisory, and management staff thus increasing cost and reducing the utilization of the trade crews.

Alternatively, DAGS would support the reconvening of the "interagency working group" identified in Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, to evaluate the outcomes of the transfers of resources that have occurred, address issues that currently exist, and develop solutions to resolve these issues.

Honorable Chair Kidani and committee members:

I am Kris Coffield, representing IMUAlliance, a nonpartisan political advocacy organization that currently boasts over 300 local members. On behalf of our members, we offer this testimony <u>in support</u> of Senate Bill 984, relating to the Department of Education.

IMUAlliance supports the reestablishment of an interagency working group to review capital improvements and maintenance of public school facilities, which faced an approximately \$265 million backlog at this time last year. That said, we encourage you to establish and fund a more comprehensive overview of Act 51. It has been over 10 years since the enactment of systemic education reforms under Act 51. The progress of Act 51's impact on our state's educational goals is, as any highly effective educator would say, something that should be continuously monitored by all stakeholders, including teachers. Over 50 percent of IMUAlliance's members are teachers. On their behalf, we humbly ask you to create a working group to review instructional time increases, weighted student formula funding, technology-based learning, principal empowerment, strengthening community involvement, lowering class size, and reducing departmental bureaucracy.
