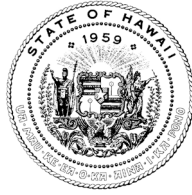

Title of Bill: HB 0531, HD1 RELATING TO ENTERPRISE TECHNOLOGY SERVICES.

Purpose of Bill: Requires the Office of Enterprise Technology Services Chief Information Officer to update the state information technology strategic plan every four years, with the first update to be completed in advance of the 2021 regular session. (HB531 HD1)

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) supports HB 531, HD1 which recommends periodic refreshes of the state information technology strategic plan and offers the following as comments.

The Department suggests keeping the information technology steering committee involved in the strategic plan refresh process. The expertise and different viewpoints of the information technology steering committee provides assurances that any unique needs of other state departments are included and addressed as part of plan refreshes.

Dear Chair Keohokalole, Vice Chair English, and Committee Members:

My name is Christine Sakuda and I serve as the executive director of Transform Hawai'i Government (THG), a coalition of organizations and individuals who believe in improving government services and business practices through technology to ensure that policymakers, State employees, local residents and businesses have convenient and secure access to reliable information and data on demand.

THG strongly supports House Bill 531, HD1, Relating to Enterprise Technology Services, which requires the Office of Enterprise Technology Services Chief Information Officer to update the state information technology (IT) strategic plan every four years, with the first update to be completed in advance of the 2021 regular session.

Ever-evolving technology necessitates periodic updates to the IT strategic plan to ensure that our State is fully maximizing available modern resources in the delivery of services, information and data to public- and private-sector leaders, individual citizens and businesses. This measure builds on existing statutorily required duties around the development of the strategic plan (HRS section 27-43(a)) and maintaining and expanding government data availability and transparency (HRS sections 27-44 and 27-44.3). We agree that requiring the plan to be regularly refreshed will promote continuity of services, regardless of transitions from administration to administration.

The commitment of State government leadership to strategic business and IT transformation over the long term is essential to successfully harnessing the power of technology. Benefits include:

- increased service quality and satisfaction for Hawai'i's citizens and businesses across all islands;
- elevating the State's workforce so they are able to compete within a 21st Century economy with living wages;
- securing and protecting citizens' data and privacy in the modern era; and
- promoting cost-efficiency, effectiveness, and transparency in the use of taxpayer funds.
