
HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE INCLUSION OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA IN THE
VISA WAIVER PROGRAM.

1 WHEREAS, tourism is Hawaii's largest single source of
2 private capital, creating \$1,300,000,000 in state tax revenues
3 annually and providing one-hundred forty-five thousand jobs
4 statewide; and

5
6 WHEREAS, diversifying Hawaii's tourism industry to
7 accommodate a substantial Chinese market-base will develop a
8 broader foundation for the tourism industry in Hawaii as a
9 whole; and

10
11 WHEREAS, the world's second largest economy, the People's
12 Republic of China is now a major trade partner with the United
13 States, a force for stability and peace in Asia, and a world
14 leader in the auto market and the world's largest producer of
15 energy; and

16
17 WHEREAS, the People's Republic of China has 1.3 billion
18 people, representing a very large and lucrative pool of
19 visitors; and

20
21 WHEREAS, Hawaii has a long and noteworthy history with the
22 People's Republic of China, the origin of Hawaii's first sugar
23 plantation laborers and of a past Chinese president who was
24 educated in Hawaii; and

25
26 WHEREAS, according to the Department of State, the United
27 States government processed more than one million visas for
28 Chinese applicants during fiscal year 2011; and

29
30 WHEREAS, the United States is in competition with other
31 countries for tourism business from the People's Republic of
32 China, with Canada recently granting the People's Republic of



1 China a ten year visa and France having a more efficient visa
2 process for Chinese travelers, thereby capturing eighteen
3 percent more visitors last year; and
4

5 WHEREAS, although certain travel restrictions are
6 reasonable, especially in light of the continuing threat of
7 terrorism, other restrictions not only are illogical but also
8 hurt states like Hawaii that depend heavily on the visitor
9 industry; and
10

11 WHEREAS, the tourism industry remains the backbone of
12 Hawaii's economy, and any restriction that impedes visitors'
13 access to Hawaii correspondingly hurts the economy, and Chinese
14 travelers cite the expense and difficulty of obtaining a visa as
15 one of the key reasons for deciding to travel to countries other
16 than the United States; and
17

18 WHEREAS, one solution to ease this problem is for a country
19 to be admitted to the Department of State's Visa Waiver Program,
20 which allows nationals from foreign countries to enter the
21 United States for tourism or business-related purposes for as
22 long as ninety days without obtaining a visa; and
23

24 WHEREAS, members of Hawaii's business and government
25 communities welcomed two hundred seventy-one passengers at
26 Honolulu International Airport from China Eastern Airlines'
27 inaugural direct flight from Shanghai in August 2011; and
28

29 WHEREAS, the average Chinese tourist to Hawaii spends about
30 \$368 per day, compared to \$275 daily for a Japanese tourist and
31 \$178 per day for all tourists to Hawaii; and
32

33 WHEREAS, the United States Senate advanced legislation that
34 would add twenty new consular officers and other measures that
35 would expedite visa processing in the People's Republic of
36 China; and
37

38 WHEREAS, in order for a country to qualify for the Visa
39 Waiver Program, the country must satisfy certain conditions,
40 with the United States government retaining the ultimate
41 discretion to admit the country to the program; and



1 WHEREAS, one condition for entry into the waiver program is
2 the rate of refusal of a country's visa applicants which must be
3 three percent or lower; and

4
5 WHEREAS, the refusal rate for Chinese visa applicants was
6 13.3 percent as of last year; and

7
8 WHEREAS, the Travel and Tourism Advisory Board recommended
9 that easing visa restrictions and the visa application and
10 approval process should include:

- 11
12 (1) Raising the visa refusal rate from three to ten
13 percent;
14
15 (2) Establishing a maximum wait time for in-person visa
16 interviews of five days;
17
18 (3) Adding four to six visa processing locations and
19 several hundred consulate officers to process visas;
20 and
21
22 (4) Allowing non-immigrant visas to last ten years for
23 Chinese visitors, which is permitted in other
24 countries; and

25
26 WHEREAS, both Japan and South Korea qualify for visa
27 waivers; and

28
29 WHEREAS, when South Korea became one of the thirty-six
30 countries in the Department of State's Visa Waiver Program in
31 November of 2008, it boosted tourism to Hawaii from that
32 country; now, therefore,

33
34 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
35 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
36 of 2012, that the Department of State, the Department of
37 Homeland Security, and the Department of Justice are urged to
38 include the People's Republic of China in the Visa Waiver
39 Program and to support the recommendations of the Travel and



1 Tourism Advisory Board to ease visa restrictions and the visa
2 application and approval process for business and tourist
3 travelers from the People's Republic of China; and

5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
6 Resolution be transmitted to the Secretary of State, the
7 Secretary of Homeland Security, and the United States Attorney
8 General.
