S.B. NO. 343

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DENTAL HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that most states are not
2 doing enough to prevent tooth decay, unnecessarily driving up
3 health care costs for families and taxpayers. A new report by
4 the Pew Center on the States, Falling Short: Most States Lag on
5 Dental Sealants, grades all fifty states on their efforts to
6 prevent decay by improving access for low-income children to
7 sealants, clear plastic coatings applied to the chewing surfaces
8 of molars. In the report, states were graded based on four
9 indicators: having sealant programs in high-need schools;
10 allowing hygienists to place sealants in school-based programs
11 without requiring a dentist's exam; collecting data regularly
12 about the dental health of schoolchildren and submitting it to
13 the national oral health surveillance system; and meeting a
14 national objective on sealants set by the federal government's
15 Healthy People 2010 goals.

16 Hawaii was one of only five states to receive a grade of
17 "F", with a total of one out of eleven possible points. An "F"
18 grade indicates a state is lagging far behind in prevention



1 efforts and could be doing more to reduce pain and costs
2 associated with dental problems. Research shows that providing
3 dental sealants through school-based programs is a cost-
4 effective way to reach low-income children, who are at greater
5 risk of decay.

6 The legislature further finds that school-based dental
7 sealant programs provide sealants to children least likely to
8 receive them otherwise. Studies have shown that tooth decay of
9 molars dropped an average of sixty per cent up to five years
10 after sealant application in a school program. Sealants also
11 prevent decay at one-third the expense of filling a cavity.

12 States wishing to establish a school-based sealant program
13 must also explore potential funding avenues. Some states with
14 school-based dental sealant programs, such as Ohio, receive
15 funding through the federal Maternal and Child Health Block
16 Grant. Other funding possibilities may also be available,
17 including program-generated revenue through collections from
18 medicaid. The legislature notes that medicaid currently covers
19 sealants for eligible recipients in Hawaii.

20 The legislature additionally finds that the Pew report
21 noted Hawaii was one of eight states with the most restrictions
22 on dental hygienists, the primary practitioners who apply



1 sealants in school-based programs. Removing unnecessary
2 restrictions on dental hygienists will eliminate expensive and
3 unnecessary barriers to serving children in school-based sealant
4 programs.

5 The legislature therefore finds that the State must take
6 proactive steps to make prevention of tooth decay amongst
7 Hawaii's children a top priority.

8 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

- 9 (1) Require the director of health to participate in the
10 national oral health surveillance system, a national
11 database managed by the federal Centers for Disease
12 Control and Prevention and the Association of State
13 and Territorial Dental Directors;
- 14 (2) Permit dental hygienists to apply preventative
15 sealants in a school-based dental sealant program;
- 16 (3) Require the department of health to establish and
17 administer a school-based dental sealant program in a
18 high-need demonstration school;
- 19 (4) Require the department of health to report to the
20 legislature about the department's efforts to
21 prioritize prevention of tooth decay amongst the
22 State's children; and



1 (5) Appropriate funds to establish and administer a
2 school-based dental sealant program in a high-need
3 demonstration school, including plans to implement the
4 program on a statewide level.

5 SECTION 2. Section 321-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6 amended to read as follows:

7 "**§321-63 Director's specific duties and powers.** To carry
8 out the purposes of this part the director of health shall:

9 (1) Take such action as may be necessary, and authorized
10 by law, to meet conditions prescribed for
11 participation in all related federal dental health
12 programs and the regulations adopted thereunder;
13 determine qualifications of personnel requiring
14 professional training and licenses and correlate the
15 programs of the department with the profession and
16 related agencies for the proper and efficient
17 functioning of the department;

18 (2) Enter into cooperative arrangements with other
19 departments, agencies, and institutions, public or
20 private;

21 (3) Participate in the national oral health surveillance
22 system, a national database managed by the federal



1 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the
2 Association of State and Territorial Dental Directors;

3 ~~[(3)]~~ (4) Submit plans relating to dental health to the
4 United States Public Health Service and make
5 application for such federal funds as will assist in
6 carrying out the purposes of this part;

7 ~~[(4)]~~ (5) Accept on behalf of the State and deposit with
8 the director of finance any grant, gift, or
9 contribution from the federal government or other
10 source made to assist in meeting the cost of carrying
11 out the purposes of this part and expend the same for
12 such purposes; and

13 ~~[(5)]~~ (6) Make an annual report on activities and
14 expenditures pursuant to this part, including
15 recommendations for additional plans, measures, or
16 legislation relating to the purposes of this part."

17 SECTION 3. Section 447-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

19 "(b) Clinical dental hygiene may be practiced by a
20 licensed dental hygienist. The practice of clinical dental
21 hygiene is defined as the removal of hard and soft deposits and
22 stains from the portion of the crown and root surfaces to the



1 depth of the gingival sulcus, polishing natural and restored
2 surfaces of teeth, the application of preventive chemical agents
3 to the coronal surfaces of teeth, which chemical agents have
4 been approved by the board of dental examiners, and the use of
5 mouth washes approved by the board, but shall not include the
6 performing of any repair work or the preparation thereof, or any
7 other operation on the teeth or tissues of the mouth; provided
8 that nothing in this subsection shall prohibit a dental
9 hygienist from using or applying topically any chemical agent
10 which has been approved in writing by the department of health
11 for any of the purposes set forth in part V of chapter 321[7];
12 provided further that nothing in this subsection shall prohibit
13 a dental hygienist from applying preventative sealants in a
14 school-based dental sealant program established pursuant to Act
15 _____ , Session Laws of Hawaii 2013; and other procedures
16 delegated by a dentist in accordance with the rules of the board
17 of dental examiners.

18 In addition, a licensed dental hygienist may administer
19 intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block
20 anesthesia under the direct supervision of a dentist after being
21 certified by the board, and for those categories of intra-oral
22 infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia



1 for which the licensed dental hygienist has been certified
2 through a course of study meeting the requirements of this
3 chapter."

4 SECTION 4. (a) The department of health shall establish
5 and administer a school-based dental sealant program in a high-
6 need demonstration school, to provide sealants to high-risk
7 students with susceptible permanent molar teeth.

8 (b) The department of health shall consult with the
9 department of education; department of human services, med-quest
10 division; federally qualified health centers; community health
11 centers; and members of the oral health community in
12 establishing and administering the program. A needs assessment
13 shall be conducted to determine what area of the State would
14 best serve as the location of the demonstration school. The
15 needs assessment may include considerations related to
16 geographic area; target population, including income level and
17 school grade; and the number of students eligible for the
18 program.

19 (c) The department of health shall determine a plan to
20 establish a statewide school-based dental sealant program,
21 including exploring federal funding possibilities for the



1 program and submitting an application for any federal funds that
2 may be available.

3 (d) The department of health shall submit a report to the
4 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
5 the regular session of 2015. The report shall detail the
6 department's efforts to prioritize prevention of tooth decay
7 amongst the State's children, including:

- 8 (1) Progress in implementing the school-based dental
9 sealant program at the demonstration school;
- 10 (2) Strategies and goals associated with implementing a
11 statewide school-based dental sealant program;
- 12 (3) Steps taken to secure funding and sustainability of
13 the statewide school-based dental sealant program;
- 14 (4) The department's plan to meet the United States
15 Department of Health and Human Services' Healthy
16 People 2010 oral health objective 21-8, which calls
17 for fifty per cent of the State's eight-year-old and
18 fourteen-year-old children to have sealants on their
19 permanent molar teeth; and
- 20 (5) Any recommendations, including proposed legislation,
21 needed to implement the statewide school-based dental
22 sealant program.



1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$100,000 or so much
 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the
 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
 5 2014-2015 for the department of health to establish and
 6 administer a school-based dental sealant program in a high-need
 7 demonstration school, including plans to implement the program
 8 on a statewide level.

9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
 10 of health for the purposes of this Act.

11 SECTION 6. In printing this Act, the revisor of statutes
 12 shall insert in section 3 of this Act the corresponding Act
 13 number of this Act.

14 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

16 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.

Description:

Requires the director of health to participate in the national oral health surveillance system. Permits dental hygienists to apply preventative sealants in a school-based dental sealant program. Requires the department of health to establish and administer a school-based dental sealant program in a high-need demonstration school and report to the legislature about the department's efforts to prioritize prevention of tooth decay. Appropriates funds to establish and administer a school-based dental sealant program in a high-need demonstration school, including plans to implement the program on a statewide level.
