A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROSTITUTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 712-1209.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended to read as follows:

3 "**§712-1209.6 Prostitution; motion to vacate conviction.**

4 (1) A person convicted of committing the offense of
5 prostitution under section 712-1200, loitering for the purpose
6 of engaging in or advancing prostitution under section 712-1206,
7 street solicitation of prostitution in designated areas under
8 section 712-1207, or convicted of a lesser offense when
9 originally charged with a violation of section 712-1200,
10 712-1206, or 712-1207, may file a motion to vacate the
11 conviction if the [~~defendant's participation in the offense was~~
12 ~~the result of the person having been a victim of:~~

13 ~~(a) Sex trafficking under section 712-1202 or promoting~~
14 ~~prostitution under section 712-1203; or~~

15 ~~(b) A severe form of trafficking in persons as defined in~~
16 ~~title 22 United States Code section 7102(9)(A).]~~

4 ~~(6) This section shall not apply to a motion to vacate a~~
5 ~~conviction under this chapter for:~~

6 ~~(a) Sex trafficking under section 712-1202;~~

7 ~~(b) Promoting prostitution under section 712-1203; or~~

8 ~~(c) A person who pays, agrees to pay or offers a fee to~~
9 ~~another person to engage in sexual conduct.]"~~

10 SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
11 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
12 begun before its effective date.

13 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

15 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Prostitution; Motion to Vacate

Description:

Allows a defendant convicted of certain prostitution offenses to file a motion to vacate the conviction if the defendant is not subsequently convicted of any offense under the penal code within three years after the date of the original conviction. Repeals certain requirements pertaining to filing a motion to vacate, including the burden of proof, and exclusions of certain convictions of certain prostitution offenses.
