
HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION OF HAWAII AND THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO OPPOSE "CONCEALED CARRY RECIPROCITY" LEGISLATION.

1 WHEREAS, the concealed carry of a loaded handgun with a
2 permit is legal in the State of Hawaii and in all fifty states,
3 and each state has its own standards for who may carry a firearm
4 in public; and
5

6 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii has allowed the concealed
7 carry of firearms and has always applied its own standards,
8 including authorizing issuers to deny permits to people who lack
9 good moral character or good moral cause to carry concealed
10 handguns; and
11

12 WHEREAS, while the State of Hawaii requires safety training
13 for every concealed carry permit applicant, nineteen states
14 allow concealed carry by people who have never had safety
15 training; and
16

17 WHEREAS, unlike the State of Hawaii, twenty-five states do
18 not allow issuers to deny concealed carry by people with
19 dangerous warning signs, such as a history of domestic
20 disturbances or mental health concerns; and
21

22 WHEREAS, while the State of Hawaii blocks anyone with a
23 felony stalking conviction from attaining a concealed carry
24 permit, twenty-two states allow concealed carry by some
25 convicted stalkers; and
26

27 WHEREAS, while the State of Hawaii blocks concealed carry
28 by abusive domestic partners subject to restraining orders,
29 fifteen states allow concealed carry by some of these abusers or
30 individuals with domestic violence convictions; and
31

32 WHEREAS, "concealed carry reciprocity" would force the
33 State to allow any of these individuals - people with no firearm
34 safety training, people with dangerous histories, people with



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1 violent misdemeanor records, convicted stalkers, and abusive
2 domestic partners - to carry concealed handguns in public; and
3

4 WHEREAS, twelve states do not require any permit, training,
5 or criminal history check to carry a concealed firearm in
6 public, including eight states that have repealed their permit
7 requirement in the past three years; and
8

9 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii attracts visitors from the
10 remaining forty-nine states and Washington, D.C., in addition to
11 visitors traveling from around the world; and
12

13 WHEREAS, "concealed carry reciprocity" would force the
14 State to accept lesser standards and allow certain people to
15 carry concealed guns throughout the State; and
16

17 WHEREAS, public safety decisions are often conducted on the
18 local level, and each state has always retained its own
19 authority to determine which individuals are too dangerous or
20 reckless to carry concealed firearms; and
21

22 WHEREAS, concealed carry standards are not similar to
23 driver's licenses because states set largely identical
24 requirements for driving and uniformly require an eyesight test,
25 a road test, and a written test, while concealed carry standards
26 vary drastically by state and several states do not require
27 permits at all; and
28

29 WHEREAS, unlike with driver's licenses, there is often no
30 way to confirm that an out-of-state concealed carry permit is
31 valid, and in contrast with "concealed carry reciprocity",
32 states have voluntarily recognized each other's driver's
33 licenses; now, therefore,
34

35 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
36 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
37 of 2018, that this body opposes federal "concealed carry
38 reciprocity" legislation, such as S. 446, 115th Cong. 2017;
39 H.R. 38, 115th Cong. 2017; and other similar legislation that
40 proposes to:

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- 1 (1) Remove state and local police power to set public
- 2 safety standards for who may carry a concealed firearm
- 3 in public; and
- 4
- 5 (2) Put local law enforcement at risk when encountering an
- 6 armed out-of-state visitor who may be carrying with no
- 7 permit whatsoever - often leaving police and sheriffs
- 8 with no means to verify whether the person is carrying
- 9 lawfully; and



 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body urges Hawaii's
 12 congressional delegation and the United States Congress to
 13 oppose federal "concealed carry reciprocity" legislation; and

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body reiterates its
 16 support for common-sense gun legislation to keep guns out of
 17 dangerous hands, including standards that ensure people cannot
 18 legally carry guns concealed in Hawaii communities without
 19 proper safety training or if they pose a danger to the public;

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
 23 Resolution be transmitted to the Majority Leader of the United
 24 States Senate, Speaker of the United States House of
 25 Representatives, and Hawaii's congressional delegation.
