

1 family caregivers. The legislature additionally finds that
2 proper funding for the aging and disability resource center is
3 essential to ensure the center is an effective single point of
4 entry for individuals seeking information about appropriate
5 long-term care options. Ensuring the availability of services
6 once a consumer receives a referral, such as those offered
7 through the kupuna care program, is also critical to the success
8 of the aging and disability resource center.

9 The purpose of this part is to provide funding to support
10 the State's kupuna care program and aging and disability
11 resource center.

12 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$4,145,696 or so much
14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
15 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
16 2016-2017 for the kupuna care program; provided that the sums
17 appropriated shall be in addition to the base budget of the
18 executive office on aging.

19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
20 of health for the purposes of this part.

21 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
22 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,052,600 or so much



1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
2 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
3 2016-2017 for the aging and disability resource center.

4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
5 of health for the purposes of this part.

6 **PART II**

7 SECTION 4. Section 349-3.2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8 amended to read as follows:

9 "~~[-]~~§349-3.2~~[+]~~ **Alzheimer's disease and related dementia**
10 **services coordinator.** There is established within the executive
11 office on aging an Alzheimer's disease and related dementia
12 services coordinator to coordinate the provision of public and
13 private Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services. ~~[The~~
14 ~~coordinator shall be appointed by the director in accordance~~
15 ~~with chapters 76 and 89.] "~~

16 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$70,000 or so much
18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
19 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
20 2016-2017 for the Alzheimer's disease and related dementia
21 services coordinator position.



1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
2 of health for the purposes of this part.

3 **PART III**

4 SECTION 6. The legislature finds that every year in
5 Hawaii, on average eighty-five seniors die, 1,960 are
6 hospitalized, and 8,700 are treated in emergency departments as
7 a result of falls. Falls among the elderly also result in
8 almost \$1,200,000 in hospital and physician charges. In
9 recognition of this critical public health issue, Act 153,
10 Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, established a fall prevention and
11 early detection coordinator position within the department of
12 health's emergency medical services and injury prevention system
13 branch. This position enables the department of health to
14 support a coordinated statewide approach to prevent and reduce
15 the impact of falls among older adults.

16 The purpose of this part is to assure a continued focus on
17 fall prevention in Hawaii, which will ultimately result in
18 longer, healthier lives for the State's aging population.

19 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$32,000 or so much
21 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
22 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year



1 2016-2017 for fall prevention and early detection services for
2 the elderly.

3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
4 of health for the purposes of this part.

5 **PART IV**

6 SECTION 8. The legislature finds that senior centers in
7 Hawaii provide vital health education and screenings, fitness,
8 recreation, case management, and other services that enable
9 thousands of senior citizens to maintain wellness, support
10 independence, and avoid expensive institutional care. The
11 State's 2013 Profile of Successful Aging Among Hawaii's Older
12 Adults notes that supportive relationships, interactions with
13 the environment, and engagement in social activities have
14 positive correlations with the well-being of older adults. The
15 legislature further finds that senior centers are accessible and
16 popular places where Hawaii's kupuna may gather for social
17 engagement and physical activity that contribute to their well-
18 being.

19 The purpose of this part is to provide funding for senior
20 centers, thereby enabling kupuna to participate in activities to
21 help them remain active, healthy, and independent in their
22 community.



1 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$388,000 or so much
 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
 5 2016-2017 to provide funding for grants, pursuant to chapter
 6 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for seniors centers in the
 7 following amounts:

- 8 (1) Catholic Charities Hawaii for the
 9 Lanakila multi-purpose senior center \$185,000;
- 10 (2) Kapahulu Center \$78,000;
- 11 (3) Moiliili Community Center for the
 12 Moiliili senior center \$50,000; and
- 13 (4) Waikiki Community Center \$75,000.

14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
 15 of health for the purposes of this part.

16 PART V

17 SECTION 10. The legislature finds that the Hawaii healthy
 18 aging partnership was established in 2003 to improve the health
 19 status of older adults by empowering residents to make healthy
 20 decisions and engage in healthier lifestyles. Since its
 21 formation, the healthy aging partnership has successfully
 22 adapted evidence-based health promotion programs and disease

1 prevention programs for the multicultural population in Hawaii.
 2 The legislature further finds that participants who complete
 3 workshops offered by the healthy aging partnership feel better,
 4 are less limited by their health conditions, and often spend
 5 less time at their doctor's office. The legislature also finds
 6 that the healthy aging partnership received the 2013
 7 Multicultural Aging Award from the American Society on Aging.
 8 This award brought national recognition for the healthy aging
 9 partnership's critical role in improving the health of Hawaii's
 10 multiethnic elderly population.

11 The purpose of this part is to provide funding to support
 12 the healthy aging partnership program and its important role in
 13 improving the health and well-being of Hawaii's kupuna.

14 SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the general
 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$476,722 or so much
 16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
 17 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
 18 2016-2017 for the healthy aging partnership program of the
 19 department of health's executive office on aging.

20 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
 21 of health for the purposes of this part.

22 PART VI



1 SECTION 12. The legislature finds that one in every three
2 seniors who die each year has Alzheimer's disease or related
3 dementia. In Hawaii, a total of twenty-five thousand
4 individuals over age sixty-five have been diagnosed with
5 Alzheimer's disease - a statistic that will increase by forty
6 per cent by 2025. This does not reflect those under age sixty-
7 five who have dementia or those who are undiagnosed. An
8 estimated sixty to eighty per cent of those living with
9 cognitive impairment are not diagnosed. It is imperative for
10 the public to be aware of the importance of early detection and
11 accurate diagnosis for Alzheimer's disease and related dementia.

12 The legislature further finds that the public awareness and
13 communication subcommittee of the statewide task force on
14 Alzheimer's disease and related dementia made the key
15 recommendation calling for a public awareness campaign that
16 utilizes various media sources to positively promote adults with
17 Alzheimer's disease and related dementia with dignity and
18 respect and highlight caregivers as compassionate individuals
19 who champion the health and well-being of their loved ones.

20 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$200,000 or so much
22 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the



1 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
2 2016-2017 to establish and carryout an Alzheimer's disease and
3 related dementia public awareness campaign that will utilize
4 various media sources to positively promote adults with
5 Alzheimer's disease and related dementia with dignity and
6 respect and highlight caregivers as compassionate individuals
7 who champion the health and well-being of their loved ones.

8 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
9 of health for the purposes of this part.

10 **PART VII**

11 SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12 and stricken.

13 SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
