Hawai'i Reforestation Program (HRP), is a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit corporation was originally incorporated in 1993 in Delaware and later incorporated in Hawaii in 2010. Our mission is to reforest Hawaii island, starting with the native dry forest on Mauna Kea in the critically endangered palila bird habitat, the Kaohe Forest Reserve. We have been planting mostly sandalwood (i'liahi) trees with other native host plants. Without funding, we have been limited to about 200 seedlings per week. Current funding has allowed us to plant about 400 seedlings per week. We are seeking funds to plant 1,000 per week. This would allow us to complete the project within 5 years.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

1. To enhance our critically endangered Palila bird habitat.
2. Create a healthier watershed environment.
3. Reduce erosion of soil and protect the reefs downstream.
4. To enhance the nature trail for the visitors' education and enjoyment.
5. To complement the work of Mauna Kea Forest Restoration Program, who plants primarily mamane trees.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

1. To recreate a long term carbon sink bank for our Mauna Kea forest reserve.
2. Create jobs for our communities.
3. To save the palila bird, presently around 2,000 remain
4. For future sustainability concerns.
5. Create an educational platform.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

All Hawai'i island residents and visitors benefit by creating a healthy native dry forest and its watershed environment.

4. Describe the geographic coverage.

Mauna Kea forest reserve, and the Ka'ohe Game Management Area.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

 6. Supervising out-planting with the community. We work with the Sierra Club, the 3rd circuit community service program, Pacific Quest and others.
 7. Monitoring growth rate, using GPS technology

2. Provide a projected annual time line for accomplishing the results or outcomes of other services;

Every year Hawai'i Reforestation Program (HRP) is projecting to plant 20,000 sandalwood trees and its native host plants on the slopes of Mauna Kea to enhance the critically endangered Palila bird habitat. This proposal would allow us to plant up to 100,000 per year.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results;

To date, Hawai'i Reforestation Program (HRP) has been monitoring our out planting of 25,000 sandalwood trees since 2014. By placing color ribbons in all locations, measuring growth rates bi-annually, and by using GPS instruments and photography, we'll map out the program's results. HRP has consistently evaluated and improved our methods of out planting. We know that our volunteers need more supervision to increase our survival rate. Experienced personnel are necessary to insure higher rates of survival.

President Mark Hanson founder of HRP, has 25 years of propagation experience, an Associates degree in horticulture (Maui CC), and experience in field agriculture. Mark reintroduced the special techniques in replanting our native forest. In the last three years, HRP has worked in cooperation with the DLNR and DOFA to grow and plant sandalwood trees on Mauna Kea, with only a 50% survival rate due to the uncontrolled pig population and drought.

B. Facilities

Current facilities consist of two 20' X 30' greenhouses and 1/8 acre of propagation tables. We plan to add another 20' X 30' greenhouse, water catchment tank, propagation tables and irrigation system.

1. Mark Hanson, President will oversee and assist in managing nursery and field reforestation projects. His special skills include sandalwood propagation.

2. Ron Barboza, Vice president, has a Masters degree in anthropology/archaeology will contribute expertise in nursery monitoring and recordkeeping. He has been volunteering until HRP hired him.
3. Mark Franklin has a Bachelors degree in horticulture and will manage the field monitoring.
4. Spencer Willis has a Bachelors degree in Environmental Science will manage out planting as well as monitor and analyze the data
5. Sean Cash has extensive horticultural experience, has volunteered for a long time, and knows our field operative monitoring sites and locations for future planting.
6. Jim Buck, Secretary/Treasurer is a Certified Public Accountant with expertise in small business management. He writes grant proposals, office administration, accounting and tax preparation.

Six experienced field and nursery technicians will help part-time. We hope to grow enough to justify the hiring of an Office Manager/Volunteer Coordinator.

Jim Buck, Sec/Treas will handle the budget, accounting, taxes and most of the grant writing.

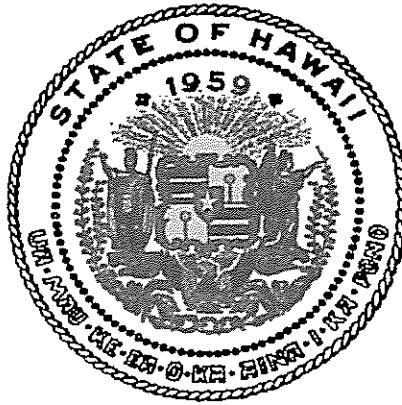

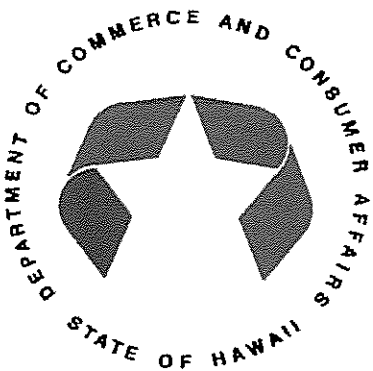

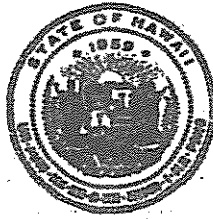

PERMISSION IS GRANTED TO: Mark Hanson, Ann Kobsa and Mark Franklin of the Hawaiian Reforestation Program Fnd Inc.

FOR THE FOLLOWING PURPOSE: To collect 10 lbs of seed from *Chamaesyce olowaluana*, 10 lbs of seed from *Bidens menziesii*, 50 lbs of seed from *Dodonaea viscosa*, 5 lbs of seed from *Dubautia ciliolata*, 10 lbs of seed from *Rubus hawaiiensis*, 10 lbs of seed from *Rumex giganteus*, 10 lbs of seed from *Sophora chrysophylla*, 10 lbs of seed from *Myoporum sandwicense*, 10 lbs of seed from *Chenopodium oahuense*, 10 lbs of seed from *Stenogyne microphylla*, 10 lbs of seed from *Coprosma montana*, 10lbs of seed from *Osteomeles anthyllidifolia*, 10 lbs of seed from *Dubautia arborea* and up to 150 lbs of seed from *Santalum paniculatum*. This seed will be germinated at Mr. Hanson's greenhouse and then outplanted in areas approved by the Mauna Kea Forest Restoration Program coordinator. Proper decontamination protocols will be observed prior to outplanting to ensure plants are clean of alien pests. Outplanting of these common native plants in approved locales within Mauna Kea Forest Reserve will occur under the direction of Chauncey AhSing of the Mauna Kea Forest Restoration Program (MKRP). Any excess seed collected will be provided to the Kamuela State Tree Nursery.

LOCATION (S): Mauna Kea Forest Reserve (see attached map)

FOR THE PERIOD: May 10th, 2016 – May 10th, 2017.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS:

All Permittees will notify Hawaii District Division of Forestry and Wildlife prior to accessing State lands and will coordinate all access with the Mauna Kea Forest Restoration Program (MKRP)

Hunting, open fires and littering are prohibited.

Camping is permitted at the Puu Laau Cabin only on weekdays and prior permission must be granted from Kanalu Sproat (887-6063) with the Division of Forestry and Wildlife Office in Kamuela for EACH trip.

Motor vehicles shall be used only on established roadways.

Vehicles shall be parked so as not to block traffic on access roads and care will be taken not to park over tall grasses or other brush that could ignite causing wildfire.

Each vehicle taken into the field will be equipped with a currently certified fire extinguisher. In case of fire immediately dial 911.

Permit is not transferable.

Activities conducted under this permit will be limited to those described in the request filed with the Division of Forestry and Wildlife office on March 17, 2016.

The removal, injury, killing, or any unnecessary disturbance of native flora and fauna is prohibited except as permitted herein.

All areas may be open Saturday, Sunday and State Holidays to public hunting. Permittees are advised to wear orange colored vests for safety. Project personnel should avoid field work on weekends and holidays due to increased numbers of hunters in the field.

Copies of any and all preliminary progress reports or publications resulting from this research will be provided to the Hawaii Division of Forestry and Wildlife's Hilo Office every quarter. A final report is due within one year of project completion.

Permittees will follow Rapid Ohia Death (ROD) Sanitation protocols as ROD is known from these Forest Reserves (see attached information/protocol)

The removal, injury, killing, or any unnecessary disturbance of native flora and fauna is prohibited except as permitted herein.

DOFAW must be contacted before sharing any sensitive information relating to caves, lava tubes, Threatened & Endangered plant information, including photos taken by Permit Holders, Sub-Permit Holders and Volunteers of rare and endangered wildlife and plants, encountered during research. Activities described in this endorsement shall not be posted on social media outlets with location information, except in the broadest of terms i.e. island and mountain range. An example of an acceptable location tag for a site on Hawai'i island would be "Northern Hualalai, or Southern Mauna Loa." Failure to comply will result in the revocation of this permit and the denial of further permits.

If Principal Permit Holder, Sub-Permit Holders, or Volunteers encounter rare and endangered wildlife and plants while conducting research activities outlined in this endorsement, said permit holders and volunteers will not visit the given rare or endangered wildlife or plant again except if absolutely necessary for conducting the research outlined in this endorsement. Similarly, Permit Holders, Sub-Permit Holders, and Volunteers will not

provide directions or location information of rare and endangered wildlife and plants to non-agency or non-permitted individuals. Failure to comply will result in the revocation of this permit and the denial of further permits.

Provision of Chapters 183, 185, and 195, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 1985, as amended, and any other laws applicable thereto, and all rules and regulations of the Department of Land and Natural Resources shall be strictly observed. Infractions or misconducts will constitute grounds for revocation of this permit and criminal prosecution. Any person whose permit has been revoked shall not be eligible to apply for another permit until the expiration of two years from the date of revocation.

The Permittee waives any and all claims he/she may have against the State of Hawaii and its respective officers, agents and employees, and agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the State of Hawaii and its respective officers, agents and employees from any suits, actions and claims arising out of or in any way connected with the activities allowed under this permit.



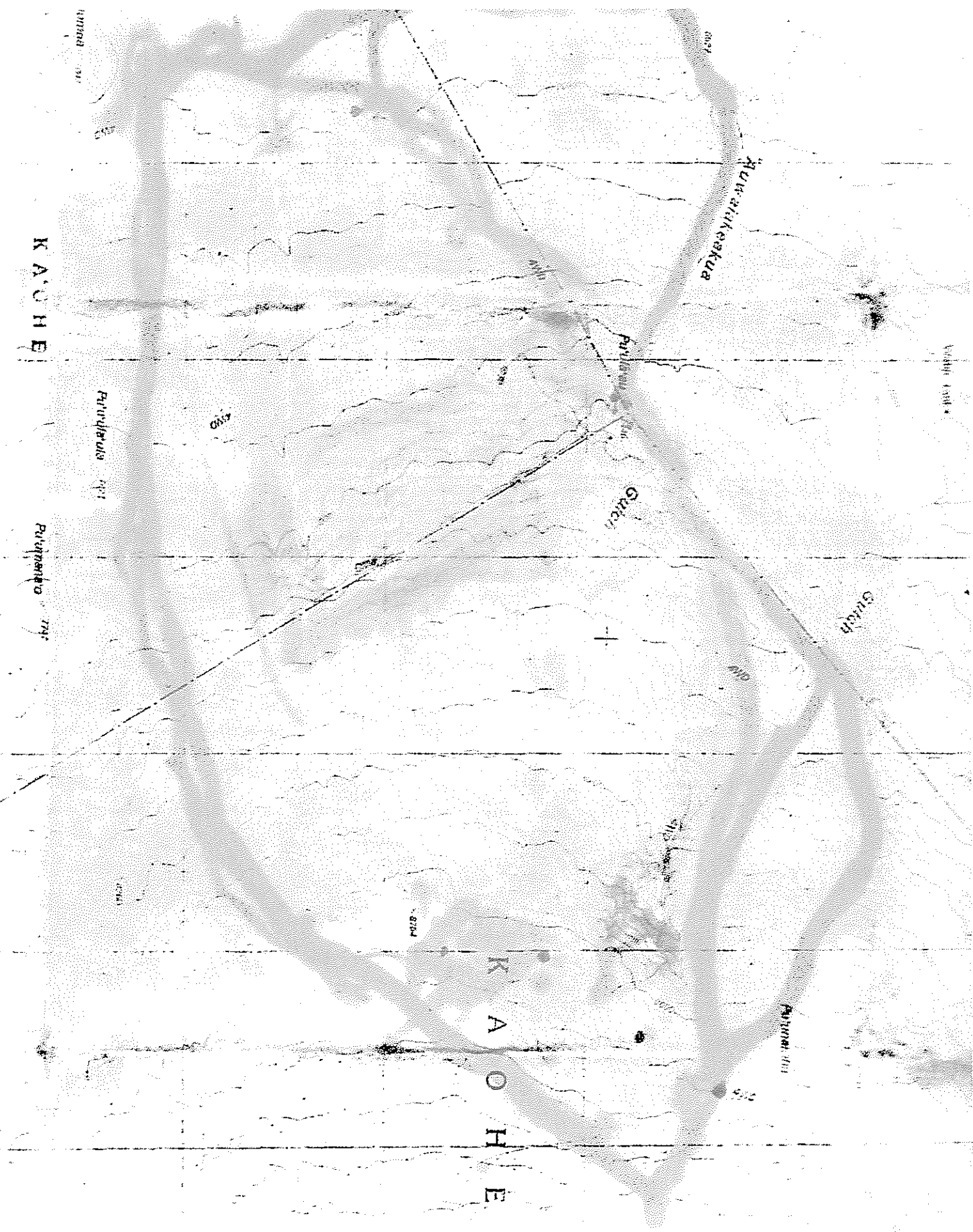
