# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BROADBAND SERVICE INFRASTRUCTURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the provision of
- 2 equitable and robust access to broadband continues to be among
- 3 the State's most pressing challenges. Hawaii needs to invest in
- 4 open access, carrier-neutral cable landing infrastructure to
- 5 attract transpacific fiber optic cable companies and expand its
- 6 fiber connectivity to the world and throughout the islands,
- 7 particularly in rural, underserved, and unserved communities, to
- 8 achieve the digital equity necessary to build a resilient
- 9 digital economy. Attracting partners with the necessary
- 10 technical expertise and resources can develop Hawaii into a
- 11 strategic communications and knowledge hub in the Pacific. This
- 12 hub would incorporate a robust global communications network and
- 13 provide cloud platforms to establish next generation
- 14 applications, such as artificial intelligence and smart
- 15 communities, in Hawaii.
- 16 The legislature further finds that to build a robust
- 17 broadband infrastructure, the State must act quickly to take

1 advantage of various federal and private funds available this year. For example, the 2021 federal Consolidated Appropriations 2 3 Act earmarks: 4 (1) At least \$30,000,000 for the department of Hawaiian 5 home lands; (2) \$3,200,000,000 nationally in an emergency broadband 7 benefit for low-income Americans to become connected 8 or remain connected to broadband; (3) \$250,000,000 nationally for a new telehealth pilot 10 program; 11 (4) \$300,000,000 for a national grant program to fund 12 broadband in rural areas; and 13 (5) \$65,000,000 for the improvement of the nation's 14 broadband maps. 15 The legislature notes that the first phase of deployment of 16 these federal funds, in part, supports the South American 17 Pacific Link, a transpacific fiber cable project that would 18 connect Hawaii to South America, Central America, and the east 19 coast of the continental United States. \$100,000,000 is available from the United States Department of

- 1 broadband capacity to support telecommuting through pilot
- 2 projects focused on building broadband infrastructure.
- 3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to ensure that the
- 4 State takes full advantage of available funds to build and
- 5 maintain the broadband infrastructure necessary to sustain
- 6 interconnectivity throughout islands by:
- 7 (1) Requiring the University of Hawaii and Hawaii
- 8 broadband and digital equity office to convene a
- 9 working group; and
- 10 (2) Appropriating funds to the University of Hawaii for
- 11 the administration of the working group.
- 12 SECTION 2. (a) The University of Hawaii and Hawaii
- 13 broadband and digital equity office shall jointly convene a
- 14 working group to determine the appropriate governance structure
- 15 to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure
- 16 development in the State.
- 17 (b) The working group shall consist of the following
- 18 members, or their designees:
- 19 (1) The president of the University of Hawaii, who shall
- 20 serve as co-chair;

1 (2) The strategic broadband coordinator, who shall serve 2 as co-chair; 3 The director of finance; (3) 4 The director of commerce and consumer affairs; (4)5 (5) The comptroller; 6 (6) The director of business, economic development, and 7 tourism; 8 (7) The chairperson of the Hawaiian homes commission; and (8) The mayors of the counties. 10 The co-chairs of the working group shall invite the (c) 11 following individuals to become members of the working group: 12 (1)The governor; 13 (2) The State's congressional delegation; 14 (3) Representatives from private sector partners; and 15 (4) Others as recommended by the working group. 16 (d) The working group shall: 17 (1)Provide recommendations for an appropriate governing 18 body to oversee and maintain the State's strategic 19 broadband infrastructure assets; 20 (2) Consider the technical, operational, maintenance, and 21 financial sustainability of broadband infrastructure

1		development for services that are robust, resilient
2		and affordable;
3	(3)	Consult with subject matter experts in finance,
4		telecommunications, regulatory bodies, and any other
-5		areas as it deems necessary; and
6	(4)	Identify revenue sources to sustain the operation and
7		maintenance costs of broadband infrastructure and
8		assets, including landing fees, fiber cross-connects,
9		and indefeasible rights of use for terrestrial fiber.
10	(e)	Members of the working group shall serve without
11	compensat	ion but shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses
12	necessary	for the performance of their duties, including travel
13	expenses.	No member of the working group shall be subject to
14	chapter 8	4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of the
15	member's	participation in the working group.
16	(f)	The working group shall submit a report of its
17	findings	and recommendations, including any proposed
18	legislati	on, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
19	to the co	nvening of the regular session of 2024.
20	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
21	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so

- 1 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for
- 2 the administration of the working group in section 2 of this
- 3 Act.

- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 5 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
