A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROCUREMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that during challenging
- 2 economic times, it is necessary for the State to investigate and
- 3 employ digital technology and other innovative ways of
- 4 maintaining and improving state services and infrastructure,
- 5 ensure input by stakeholders, and ensure the prudent and
- 6 cost-effective expenditure of public moneys.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the state procurement
- 8 office is responsible for reviewing the solicitation, award, and
- 9 administration of contracts, advising government agencies on
- 10 procurement issues, and providing procurement training to the
- 11 State's decentralized procurement staff. The state procurement
- 12 office administers statewide, multi-agency contracts that take
- 13 advantage of the State's aggregated purchasing power to leverage
- 14 better pricing and value for the State and the counties. In
- 15 fiscal year 2018-2019, these contracts saved the State and its
- 16 political subdivisions approximately \$19,000,000 in goods and

- 1 services, plus savings in personnel, purchasing, and subject
- 2 matter expert hours.
- 3 The legislature additionally finds that government
- 4 purchasing offices for several states operate using a
- 5 self-funded model derived from a transaction fee ranging from
- 6 one per cent to 2.5 per cent charged to all contracts in their
- 7 respective procurement automation systems.
- 8 Beginning in fiscal year 2022-2023, this Act authorizes the
- 9 state procurement office to assess all vendors a transaction fee
- 10 not to exceed 2.5 per cent on each order the vendor receives on
- 11 the procurement automation systems. This transaction fee will
- 12 be used to pay for the development, implementation, legacy
- 13 transition, maintenance, system training, configuration, and
- 14 management of procurement automation systems. To manage the
- 15 systems, the state procurement office requests the addition of
- 16 one position.
- 17 The special committee on State of Hawaii procurement, which
- 18 has been reviewing state procurement policies and procedures,
- 19 informally notified the state procurement office that additional
- 20 oversight over complex procurement issues, such as construction
- 21 procurement for the State, is necessary. To provide adequate

1	guidance	and oversight to state and county agencies, the state
2	procureme	nt office will require qualified procurement personnel
3	and thus	seeks the addition of four positions.
4	The	purpose of this Act is to improve procurement
5	efficienc	y, minimize risks, and save taxpayer dollars by:
6	(1)	Creating the state procurement automation system
7		special fund;
8	(2)	Defining the term "procurement automation system";
9	(3)	Authorizing the administrator of the state procurement
10		office to develop and administer procurement
11		automation systems and charge and collect a
12		transaction fee from all vendors using the procurement
13		automation systems to fund the development,
14		implementation, and maintenance of the systems;
15	(4)	Deleting language regarding qualified community
16		rehabilitation programs made redundant by Act 55,
17		Session Laws of Hawaii 2021; and
18	(5)	Adding one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position to
19		manage the procurement automation systems and an
20		additional four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE)

1	positions to ensure oversight over state and county
2	procurement and complex procurement issues.
3	SECTION 2. Chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
5	designated and to read as follows:
6	"§103D- State procurement automation system special
7	fund. (a) There is established in the state treasury the state
8	procurement automation system special fund to be administered by
9	the state procurement office, into which shall be deposited:
10	(1) All revenues from the operation of the procurement
11	automation systems, including transaction fees
12	collected from all vendors using the procurement
13	automation systems;
14	(2) Interest earned on money in the state procurement
15	automation system special fund; and
16	(3) Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund.
17	(b) Moneys in the state procurement automation system
18	special fund shall be used by the state procurement office for
19	the development, implementation, management, and operation of
20	the procurement automation systems."

2	amended by	y adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
3	and to re	ad as follows:
4	""Pr	ocurement automation system" means an electronic
5	procureme	nt, accounting-oriented, multi-module, data-based
6	system th	at integrates procurement activities from solicitation
7	to contra	ct management."
8	SECT	ION 4. Section 103D-206, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended t	o read as follows:
10	"§10	3D-206 Additional duties of the administrator of the
11	procureme	nt office. In addition to the duties referred to in
12	section 1	03D-205, the administrator shall:
13	(1)	Perform periodic review of the procurement practices
14		and procedures of all governmental bodies, in
15		collaboration with the state procurement policy board,
16		for compliance with the procurement code;
17	(2)	Assist, advise, and guide governmental bodies in
18		matters relating to procurement;
19	(3)	Determine corrective actions; provided that if a
20		procurement officer under the jurisdiction of the
21		administrator of the state procurement office or a

ı		chief procurement officer of any of the other state
2		entities under section 103D-203, fails to comply with
3		any determination rendered by the administrator within
4		thirty days from the date of the issuance of the
5		determination, or longer if permitted by the
6		administrator upon request by the procurement officer
7		or a chief procurement officer, the procurement
8		officer or chief procurement officer shall be subject
9		to an administrative fine under section 103D-106, for
10		every day of noncompliance;
11	(4)	Develop and administer a statewide procurement
12		orientation and training program;
13	(5)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement manual
14		for all state procurement officials; [and]
15	(6)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement guide
16		for vendors wishing to do business with the State and
17		its counties[+];
18	<u>(7)</u>	Develop and administer procurement automation systems;
19		and

1	(8) Assess, charge, and collect a transaction fee for the
2	use of the procurement automation systems to cover
3	procurement automation system costs."
4	SECTION 5. Section 103D-1010, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
6	"(a) Any governmental body, without advertising or calling
7	for bids, may purchase goods or services provided by qualified
8	community rehabilitation programs serving persons with
9	disabilities that have indicated an interest in supplying the
10	goods or services and on an equitable basis may apportion the
11	business among the interested programs; provided that the goods
12	and services meet the specifications and needs of the purchasing
13	agency and are purchased at a fair market price as determined by
14	the appropriate public agency; and provided further that the
15	programs [comply with the following:
16	(1) Meet] meet all of the requirements of a qualified
17	community rehabilitation program under section
18	103D-1001[; and
19	(2) Maintain a disabled to non-disabled employee ratio
20	equal to or in excess of three-to-one for work hours
21	of direct labor at all times on the work contracted]."

- 1 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to
- 4 fund five full-time equivalent (5.0 FTE) purchasing specialist
- 5 positions, of which one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position
- 6 shall manage the procurement automation system within the state
- 7 procurement office.
- 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the state
- 9 procurement office for the purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 11 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 12 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
