A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEX TRAFFICKING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a
- 2 form of modern-day slavery. According to a 2018 report
- 3 published by Arizona State University and the Hawaii state
- 4 commission on the status of women, it is estimated that one of
- 5 every eleven adult male residents of Hawaii are online sex
- 6 shoppers. The report also estimated that there were 74,362
- 7 potential sex buyers in Hawaii. Moreover, Imua Alliance, a
- 8 victim service provider for survivors of sex trafficking and
- 9 sexual violence, estimates that one hundred fifty establishments
- 10 participate in the commercial sex trade in the State, increasing
- 11 the high risk for sex trafficking. During the coronavirus
- 12 disease 2019 pandemic, a service provider for sex trafficking
- 13 victims in Hawaii reported seeing a three hundred per cent
- 14 increase in demand for services.
- 15 The legislature additionally finds that Native Hawaiians
- 16 and Pacific Islanders are disproportionately overrepresented in
- 17 the State's sex trafficking survivor population. In a survey

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- 1 conducted by the Hawaii state commission on the status of women
- 2 and Arizona State University, sixty-four per cent of individuals
- 3 identified as victims of sexual exploitation possessed at least
- 4 partial Native Hawaiian ancestry. According to the report,
- 5 "[t]he overutilization of Native Hawaiians to meet sex buyer
- 6 demand may be directly linked to structural economic coercion
- 7 and vulnerabilities connected to land dispossession, exposure to
- 8 sexual violence, hypersexualization, incarceration, cultural
- 9 dislocation, intergenerational trauma, mental and emotional
- 10 distress, racism, poverty, and ongoing inequities."
- 11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to support
- 12 survivors of sex trafficking by authorizing civil claims to be
- 13 made against a business, owner of a business, or operator of a
- 14 business that profits from sexual exploitation.
- 15 SECTION 2. Chapter 663J, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by amending its title to read as follows:
- 17 "[+]CHAPTER 663J[+]
- 18 LIABILITY FOR COERCION INTO [PROSTITUTION] SEX TRAFFICKING AND
- 19 SEXUAL EXPLOITATION"
- 20 SECTION 3. Section 663J-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

1 "§663J-1 Title. This chapter may be cited as the Sex 2 Trafficking and [Prostitution] Sexual Exploitation Coercion 3 Liability Act." SECTION 4. Section 663J-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "§663J-2 Definitions. As used in this chapter: 7 "Coerce" means to use or threaten to use any form of 8 domination, restraint, or control for the purpose of causing an 9 individual to engage in or remain in [prostitution] sexual 10 exploitation or to relinquish earnings derived from 11 [prostitution.] sexual exploitation. Coercion exists if the 12 totality of the circumstances establish the existence of 13 domination, restraint, or control that would have the reasonably 14 foreseeable effect of causing an individual to engage in or 15 remain in [prostitution] sexual exploitation or to relinquish 16 earnings derived from [prostitution.] sexual exploitation. **17** ["Promoting prostitution" means promoting prostitution as 18 provided in section 712-1203. 19 "Prostitution" has the same meaning as provided in section

4	sex trafficking by that person.], business, an owner of a
5	business, or an operator of a business at any time.
6	[(b) The limitation period provided for in this chapter is
7	tolled:
8	(1) During the minority of the individual who engages in
9	prostitution; or
10	(2) Any time there is a criminal offense investigation
11	being-actively-conducted-against the defendant by a
12	governmental agency or there is a criminal offense
13	charge, information, or indictment pending against the
14	defendant.
15	For the purposes of this section, business includes a
16	transient accommodation or other commercial activity."
17	SECTION 10. Section 663J-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended to read as follows:
19	"§663J-8 Stay of action. On motion by a governmental
20	agency involved in an investigation or prosecution for
21	[promoting prostitution] sexual exploitation or sex trafficking,

- 1 an action brought under this chapter shall be stayed until the
- 2 completion of the criminal investigation or prosecution that
- 3 gave rise to the motion for a stay of the action."
- 4 SECTION 11. Section 663J-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended to read as follows:
- 6 "\$663J-9 Other remedies preserved. The remedies provided
- 7 under this chapter do not restrict the right of any individual
- 8 to bring an action under other law, including common law, to
- 9 recover damages arising out of the use of the individual in
- 10 [prostitution,] sexual exploitation, or subjecting the
- 11 individual to sex trafficking, or the coercion incident to the
- 12 individual being used in [prostitution] sexual exploitation or
- 13 sex trafficking; nor does this chapter limit or restrict the
- 14 liability of any person, business, owner of a business, or
- 15 operator of a business under other law.
- 16 For the purposes of this section, "business" includes a
- 17 transient accommodation or other commercial activity."
- 18 SECTION 12. This Act does not affect rights and duties
- 19 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
- 20 were begun before its effective date.

- 1 SECTION 13. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 14. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
