A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the single greatest
- 2 recent factor contributing to the increasing cost of living in
- 3 Hawaii is the rising cost of transportation. Due to
- 4 increasingly expensive fossil fuels and a lack of cheaper
- 5 transit options, Hawaii residents already pay among the highest
- 6 cost to commute in the country. In January 2022, the United
- 7 States Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that auto-related
- 8 costs were astonishing twenty-three per cent higher than the
- 9 year before. In Hawaii, a recent analysis studied how much all
- 10 the direct and indirect costs of car ownership and use cost in
- 11 2020 and found that local taxpaying families pay about \$24,400
- 12 per year, even if they don't own a car. These costs are only
- 13 fifty per cent covered by user fees. In addition, personal
- 14 vehicle costs add another \$16,200 per year to those household
- 15 expenditures.
- 16 The legislature also finds that electric bicycles are
- 17 significantly more cost effective for local families and better

- 1 for the environment than gas powered motor vehicles and can
- 2 effectively get many Hawaii residents to locations as
- 3 conveniently as gas powered motor vehicles. The current
- 4 electric bicycle and moped rebate program, even with minimal
- 5 promotion and low subsidy, has helped almost three hundred
- 6 people access electric bikes since its inception. However, its
- 7 reach has been limited by age restrictions that currently allows
- 8 for a fifteen year old student to drive a sports car, but not
- 9 acquire a bicycle through this program and a lower rebate than
- 10 other similar programs that is not enough for many lower income
- 11 families to afford access.
- In 2022, Denver's electric bike rebate program providing
- 13 families with up to a \$1,200 rebate led to considerable cost
- 14 savings for Denver families, helped reduce vehicular traffic on
- 15 crowded roads, and ultimately replaced many trips by car with
- 16 trips by bike. This meant twenty-two miles a week on average
- 17 per user, collectively displacing one hundred thousand miles
- 18 weekly. Ninety-six per cent of respondents said the
- 19 availability of the rebate made the difference when deciding to
- 20 buy an electric bike.
- 21 The purpose of this Act is to:

1	(1)	Help reduce the cost of transportation, reduce the
2		cost of living, and reduce traffic on Hawaii's roads
3		by improving the existing electric bicycle and moped
4		rebate program to further encourage the purchase and
5		use of adaptive electric bicycles, electric bicycles,
6		electric mopeds, and other electric mobility devices;
7		and
8	(2)	Update electric mobility device and electric bicycle
9		definitions to align with federal and state policies
10		and programs.
11	SECT	TION 2. Section 196-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended k	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately
13	inserted	and to read as follows:
14	" <u>"Ac</u>	aptive electric bicycle" means any bicycle that is
15	modified	to fit the needs of an individual rider who is unable
16	to use a	standard electric bicycle.
17	"Ele	ectric micro-mobility device" means any ground
18	transport	ation device such as a standing scooter, skateboard,
19	board rid	ling on a single or double wheels, or similar device
20	that is p	powered either exclusively by electricity from a battery
21	charged f	from an external source, or by electricity from a

1	battery c	harged from an external source in addition to human
2	power, wh	ich is designed to transport a single person, with a
3	range exc	eeding not less than twelve miles and maximum speed of
4	twenty-ei	ght miles per hour, on which a person may reasonably
5	commute t	o and from regular destinations.
6	<u>"Ele</u>	ctric bicycle" means a bicycle equipped with fully
7	operable	pedals, a saddle or seat for the rider, and an electric
8	motor of	seven hundred fifty watts or less that meets the
9	requireme	nts of one of the following three classes:
10	(1)	Class 1 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
11		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only
12		when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide
13		assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of
14		twenty miles per hour;
15	(2)	Class 2 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
16		equipped with a motor that may be used exclusively to
17		propel the bicycle, and that is not capable of
18		providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the
19		speed of twenty miles per hour; and
20	(3)	Class 3 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
21		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only

1	when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide		
2	assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of		
3	twenty-eight miles per hour."		
4	SECTION 3. Section 196-7.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
5	amended to read as follows:		
6	"[{] §196-7.8[}] Electric [bicycle and electric moped]		
7	mobility rebate program; third-party administrator; special		
8	fund. (a) The department of transportation shall administer a		
9	rebate program that incentivizes the purchase of new electric		
10	[bicycles and new electric mopeds] mobility devices and may		
11	contract with a third-party administrator pursuant to subsection		
12	(i) to operate and manage the rebate program.		
13	(b) Each eligible purchase of a new electric bicycle, [or]		
14	new electric moped, adaptive electric bicycle, or new electric		
15	micro-mobility device shall receive a rebate of [either twenty		
16	per cent of the retail cost or \$500, whichever amount is lower;		
17	\$750; provided that no individual shall receive more than [\$500]		
18	\$750 in total rebates each fiscal year[-], unless also		
19	qualifying for the additional assistance rebate as outlined in		
20	(j), in which case the eligible purchase shall receive not more		
21	than \$1,500 in total rebates each fiscal year. No non-profit		

1 organization shall receive more than \$10,000 in total rebates 2 each fiscal year. 3 (c) The department of transportation shall not issue more 4 than [\$700,000] \$2,000,000 in total rebates under this section 5 each fiscal year; provided that the electric [bicycle and 6 electric moped] mobility subaccount within the highway 7 development special fund pursuant to section 264-122(d) contains 8 sufficient funds to pay the rebates. The department of 9 transportation shall not be liable to pay any refund if 10 sufficient funds are unavailable. The department of 11 transportation shall allow valid claims filed by eligible 12 applicants for whom sufficient funds may not be immediately 13 available to receive a rebate as funds may be available in a 14 subsequent year. 15 (d) The department of transportation shall: 16 (1) Prepare any forms that may be necessary for an 17 applicant to claim a rebate pursuant to this section; 18 and 19 (2) Require each applicant to furnish reasonable 20 information to ascertain the validity of the claim, 21

including but not limited to [the signature of the

Ţ		buyer and individual responsible for the sale on
2		behalf of a retail store, a copy of valid government
3		issued photo identification of the buyer at the time
4		of the sale, receipt of purchase, name and address of
5		the retail store, verification of eligibility, and any
6		other documentation necessary to demonstrate the
7		legitimate purchase of a new electric [bicycle or new
8		electric moped.] mobility device.
9	<u>(e)</u>	The department may prepare a retailer application and
10	portal to	provide rebates directly at the point of sale to
11	expedite t	he rebate process.
12	[(e)]	(f) This section shall apply to new:
13	(1)	Electric bicycles [capable of speeds of no more than
14		twenty eight miles per hour; and];
15	(2)	Electric mopeds[-];
16	(3)	Adaptive electric bicycles; and
17	(4)	Electric micro-mobility devices capable of speeds of
18		not more than twenty-eight miles per hour,
19	purchased	at a retail store after July 1, 2022.
20	[(f)]	(g) Applicants shall submit an application to the
21	department	of transportation within twelve months of the date of

3	within twelve months of the date of purchase shall constitute a		
4	waiver of the right to claim the rebate.		
5	$[\frac{(g)}{(h)}]$ Nothing in this section shall alter taxes due or		
6	the original purchase. Any rebate received pursuant to this		
7	section shall not be considered income for the purposes of stat		
8	or county taxes.		
9	(i) In administering the electric mobility rebate program,		
10	the department of transportation shall provide rebates to:		
11	(1) Persons who are residents of the State and fifteen		
12	years or older, who purchase a new qualifying adaptive		
13	electric bicycle, electric bicycle, electric moped, or		
14	electric micro-mobility device; and		
15	(2) Non-profit organizations who are registered in the		
16	State who purchase one or more new qualifying electric		
17	bicycles, electric mopeds, or electric micro-mobility		
18	devices.		
19	[(h)] <u>(j)</u> In administering the electric [bicycle and		
20	electric moped] mobility rebate program, the department of		
21	transportation shall provide [rebates] an additional assistance		

1	repate in	addition to the repate in subsection (i). The
2	additiona	assistance rebate shall be \$750 or the full retail
3	amount, wh	ichever amount is lower, to persons [eighteen] fifteen
4	years or o	lder who:
5	(1)	Are eligible for:
6		(A) The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
7		(B) The free and reduced price lunch program;
8		(C) Section 8 of the United States Housing Act of
9		1937, as amended; or
10		(D) Similar low-income assistance programs identified
11		by the department of transportation;
12	(2)	Do not own a registered motor vehicle with four or
13		more wheels, as demonstrated by an affidavit signed by
14		the applicant at the time of sale of the new adaptive
15		electric bicycle, electric bicycle [or], electric
16		moped, or electric micro-mobility device, which may be
17		audited by the department of transportation; or
18	(3)	Are enrolled in school, community college, or
19		university.
20	[(i)]	(k) The department of transportation may contract
21	with a th	rd-party administrator to operate and manage the

- 1 electric [bicycle and electric moped] mobility rebate program.
- 2 The third-party administrator shall not be deemed to be a
- 3 "governmental body" as defined in section 103D-104; provided
- 4 that all moneys transferred to the third-party administrator
- 5 shall have been appropriated by the legislature or shall be from
- 6 moneys provided by the federal government or private funding
- 7 sources. The third-party administrator shall not expend more
- 8 than ten per cent of the amounts appropriated for the rebate
- 9 program, or any other reasonable percentage determined by the
- 10 department of transportation, for administration, promotion, and
- 11 reporting of the electric [bicycle-and-electric moped] mobility
- 12 rebate program.
- 13 (1) The department of transportation may contract with a
- 14 third-party administrator to administer the electric mobility
- 15 rebate program; provided that the third-party administrator may
- 16 pay rebates to each rebate applicant from moneys transferred
- 17 pursuant to subsection (k) from the electric mobility special
- 18 fund.
- 19 (m) The department of transportation shall provide an
- 20 annual report which shall detail the rebates provided by zip
- 21 code, amount received, and type of rebate."

- 1 SECTION 4. Section 264-122, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 3 "(d) There is established within the highway development
- 4 special fund an electric [bicycle and electric moped] mobility
- 5 subaccount. The department shall expend moneys in the
- 6 subaccount for the purposes of funding the [electric bicycle and
- 7 electric moped] mobility rebate program established pursuant to
- **8** section 196-7.8."
- 9 SECTION 5. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
- 10 department of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
