SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING THE DAY OF THE SECOND NEW MOON AFTER THE WINTER SOLSTICE OF EVERY YEAR AS THE LUNAR NEW YEAR IN THE STATE OF HAWAII.

WHEREAS, 2023 marks the two hundred and thirty-fourth 1 anniversary of the first arrival of Asian immigrant workers in 2 3 the State; and 4 WHEREAS, as of July 1, 2022, approximately 37.1 percent of 5 the State's population or over five hundred thousand residents 6 7 of the State are of Asian descent; and 8 WHEREAS, the Asian community in Hawaii has contributed 9 greatly, not only to the State's social, civic, and economic 10 success, but also to its diverse and vibrant culture, which · 11 includes the celebration of the Lunar New Year; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the Lunar New Year is joyously observed by numerous residents in the State and is celebrated by more than 15 two-thirds of Chinese, Korean, Japanese, and Vietnamese 16 17 Americans in general; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the Lunar New Year provides a time to renew one's family ties, reflect upon the past year, and wish for good 20 fortune, health, and prosperity in the year ahead; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, the United States House of Representatives introduced resolutions recognizing the cultural and historical 24 significance of the Lunar New Year in 2021 and 2023; California 25 recognized the Lunar New Year as a state holiday in 2022; and 26 New York recognized the Lunar New Year as a public school 27 28 holiday in 2023; and 29 30 WHEREAS, by recognizing the Lunar New Year in Hawaii, this 31 body honors the State's rich cultural history, demonstrates its 32 commitment to cultural diversity, and extends its best wishes

1 for peace and prosperity to all who celebrate this important occasion; now, therefore, 2 3 4 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 5 House of Representatives concurring, that the day of the second 6 new moon after the winter solstice of every year is recognized 7 as the Lunar New Year in the State of Hawaii; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Lunar New Year shall not be 10 construed as a state holiday; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor. 14 15 16 17 OFFERED BY: Store
